**Sol.** 'Take someone's word for something' is an idiomatic expression which means to believe what someone says about something without seeking further information or proof. Hence option (c) improves the sentence.

- S2. Ans.(a)

**Sol.** 'Hell-belt on doing something' is an idiom which means to be very determined to do something. Hence option (a) improves the sentence.

- S3. Ans.(c)
- **Sol.** 'Ought to' is the modal verb used to show when it is necessary or would be a good thing to perform the activity referred to by the following verb. It denotes a responsibility. Hence the best suited option is option (c).
- **Q4.** No one could explain how a calm and balanced person like him could **penetrate** such a mindless act on his friends.
- (a) perpetuate
- (b) perpetrate

#### **S4.** Ans.(b)

Sol. Penetrate: go into or through (something), especially with force or effort.

Perpetrate means carry out or commit (a harmful, illegal, or immoral action).

Perpetuate: make (something) continue indefinitely.

Precipitate: cause (an event or situation, typically one that is undesirable) to happen suddenly, unexpectedly, or prematurely.

Hence out of all, option (b) is the best suited choice as per the sentence.

Sol. Adverbs of manners are placed only after the Intransitive verb. However, the adverb can be placed either before or after the transitive verb. Since, 'sleep' is an intransitive verb; therefore we need to put the adverb 'soundly' after the verb 'slept'.

## S12. Ans.(b)

Sol. The causative verb 'make' is followed by a direct infinitive if the sentence is in active voice. Therefore, we need to replace 'to wear' with 'wear' so that the sentence can become grammatically correct.

### S13. Ans.(b)

**Sol.** There are some adjectives which don't admit of any comparative and superlative degree. Such adjectives denote absolute position. 'Perfect, unique, complete, ideal, supreme' etc. are some such adjectives. So, drop 'more' from the given sentence.

#### S14. Ans.(c)

**Sol.** The comparative adjectives such as 'prior, superior, junior, prefer' etc are followed by 'to' instead of 'than'. So, 'I prefer green tea to black coffee' is the right usage.

- (a) Dr. Gupta is considered
- (b) as the best
- (c) surgeon in the town

## S15. Ans.(b)

**Sol.** Adverb 'as' should be avoided to introduce predicative of the verbs 'name, elect, think, consider, call' etc. So, drop 'as' after 'considered' to make the sentence grammatically correct.

Also, the sentence is in passive voice and since the subject 'a new rapid diagnostic test' is singular hence, the most appropriate choice here is <b>'was granted'</b> . Hence, option (d) is the right choice here.

S18. Ans.(b)
Sol. 'do not' is the right usage as the subject is plural in nature.

Sol. The correct choice is 'inadequate' that means lacking the quality or quantity required;
